“Better ChatGPT” (<https://bettergpt.chat/>) was deployed to address the questions listed below, together with the full responses by the AI system.

We do not intend to suggest that “machine advice” should be used to supersede expert human appraisal. However, in a situation where there is controversy, the advantage of AI is that it is impartial (though it will be dependent upon the content available within its training database, and this might itself be biased). Note that repeating the same question will generally elicit a response which differs in detail, though my experience was that the overall import was the same.
